Our Mission

Community Bridges empowers diverse girls to become excellent students, positive leaders, and healthy young women.

Programs

Jump Start Girls! ¡Adelante Niñas! is a program that helps elementary and middle school girls recognize their tremendous potential. Jump Start focuses on team-building, critical thinking, the arts, health and prevention, outdoor discovery, and community action to develop the girls' self-confidence and self-expression.

LUNA (Luchando Unidas con Nuestras Amigas) serves 6th–9th-grade recent immigrant, Latina girls through weekly meetings during and after school. LUNA assists the girls in transitioning into their new communities, while celebrating their unique identities, preserving their cultural traditions, and embracing their bilingualism.

Dream Catchers Mentoring Program serves 8th–grade girls, through weekly dinner meetings with their mentors. Through field trips, group discussions, and art activities, Dream Catchers focuses on addressing girls' academic, career, and personal goals as they transition into high school.

Outdoor Adventure Summer Camp offers all the girls in our programs a week of daytime activities and a one-night sleepover. For most of our girls, this is their first camp experience. The camp provides engaging summer programming, encouraging the girls to develop self-reliance, responsibility, teamwork, and environmental and community stewardship.

Community Bridges Receives New Recognition for Its Work!



Chosen for inclusion in the 2008–2009 Catalogue for Philanthropy: Greater Washington, one of only 69 organizations selected from 230 candidates.



Awarded the Standards for Excellence Certification by the Maryland Association of Nonprofit Organizations. Certification is bestowed only to the best-managed and responsibly governed nonprofit organizations that have demonstrated compliance with 55 specific Standards for Excellence based on honesty, integrity, fairness, respect, trust, responsibility, and accountability.

Program Accomplishments

Community Bridges experienced many accomplishments this year.

More than 216 girls were served through our four programs, a 10% increase over last year.

We increased the number of schools in which we work from seven to nine, including one school in which **90%** of students qualify for Free and Reduced Meals, the federal measure of poverty.

More than 150 women and girls attended the Women, Power, World conference, co-hosted with Centro Familia, to address political empowerment, economic power, and feminine health.

Twelve girls won a competition, funded by the Clark Charitable Trust, for new laptop computers to assist them with their educational and personal goals.

Our programs achieved the following outcomes:

23% of parents increased interaction with staff and school personnel through our programs.

18% of girls met with mentors/tutors to improve grades.

69% of girls increased their aspirations to further their education.

69% of girls improved their communication, problem-solving, and conflict resolution skills.

72% of girls gained leadership skills by completing community action projects.

44% of girls assumed leadership in their schools and communities.



Program leaders also witnessed the following changes:

88% of elementary girls demonstrated a desire to continue their schooling, so that they can achieve their goals. They also have a greater understanding of the multifaceted impact that premature sexual activity would have on their lives, and they demonstrated effective conflict resolution techniques, which improve their ability to advocate for themselves and others.

90% of girls in our LUNA program demonstrated a greater capacity to advocate for themselves in their academic, personal, and social lives; **80%** of girls left negative relationships/situations in which they had been sexually active; **95%** expressed that the LUNA program is a big motivator for them to stay in school and to be successful.

Plans for Ongoing Work and Expansion

Community Bridges was granted funding for two new positions that will enable us to serve a total of **300** girls next year, an increase of **36%**. This increase is based on our strategic plan to expand to schools within the Red Zone of Montgomery County. In addition, Community Bridges is implementing plans to strengthen our programs and infrastructure to ensure that we have the capacity to respond to this new growth.

How do you stand up to a bully when you are shy?

A new participant in our middle school Jump Start Girls! ¡Adelante Niñas! program this past school year was a shy and withdrawn 12-year-old from Haiti. This sweet girl had a hard time interacting freely with the other girls and also was constantly bullied by a girl whom she considered a friend. Through her participation in our program, she became more open about herself with staff members, teachers, and girls in the program. She also learned how to be assertive in advocating for herself and her family—which empowered her to finally stand up to her bully! “I am really happy that I have a place where I feel like it’s okay to be myself,” she recently told us. We, too, are glad to know that she and the 216 other girls in our program have a place where they can be vulnerable enough to share their fears and joys, while also learning how to use their voices for good.
